TROOP MEETINGS

Every Thursday from 7:00 PM to 8:30 PM

PATROL LEADER'S COUNCIL (PLC)

The first Thursday each month before the regular Troop Meeting. The "PLC" is run by the SPL under the direction and guidance of the Scoutmaster. All Scouts are welcome to join these meetings to take part in planning for future activities.

FOR PARENTS

Troop Parents Committee Meetings are held quarterly coinciding with that month's PLC and troop meeting so all parents may attend.

FOR EVERYONE

Courts of Honor are held up to three times a year, this is a family celebration and recognition of the scouts. Parents should plan to attend to gain a better understanding of what it means to follow the scouting trail to Eagle!



MONTHLY CAMPOUTS/OUTINGS

We aim for an outdoor activity the third weekend of each month. Camp is usually Friday evening - Sunday morning. Troop youth leaders work with all scouts to develop an annual calendar of events. They do this every Fall and then fine-tune their plans at the monthly PLC. All Scouts can participate in the planning process.

OTHER ACTIVITIES

These are announced as they occur. It includes service projects, special outings, merit badge classes, and other Council or District sponsored events. These activities are announced at weekly Troop Meetings, on Band, and via email. Additionally, extended Summer Camps are planned by the girls to take place in the summer.

CANCELLATIONS & RSVPS

Troop 114G follows the Littleton
Public Schools calendar for
scheduling and snow-out/other
cancellations. The Troop maintains a
calendar in the **Band app** that can
be easily be synced to your Google or
Apple calendars.

Please help your scout make timely RSVPs to activities that require it. ("no" is still an RSVP!)







CAMPOUTS

The Troop holds a campout or overnight every month of the year. Whenever possible, campouts will be scheduled for the third weekend of the month, departing on Friday evening, and returning Sunday afternoon. We are always seeking adventurous and helpful parents to join the Committee for camping trips.

- Scouts travel in in class A uniform unless otherwise stated.
- Scouts should bring a **sack dinner for Friday** night to eat on the way to the camping location.
- Campers typically **depart at 5:00 PM** and will return on Sunday in the late morning/early afternoon.
- When our return interferes with church services, we return to the **Littleton Historical Museum**.
- When possible, a Band message will be sent during the ride home to let parents know when to expect campers. Please be ready to pick up your scout promptly upon return.
- Scouts (and parents) should RSVP on Band by the first Troop meeting of the month if they plan to attend the campout that month.
- Until 1st Class, Scouts are required to bring their gear to the meeting before camp for pack inspection. Youth leaders will check bags to ensure they are adequately prepared.
- Menus and food are planned by a Patrol member. The expense of food will be reimbursed to the scout family, and covered by the cost of the trip. Trip costs will be announced after camp when expenses are calculated.









COMMUNITY SERVICE

A major part of Scouting is service to others. Participating in service projects is required for all rank advancements. Leading projects is necessary for advancing to the ranks of Life and Eagle. Organizing projects provides learning opportunities for youth leaders.

Service projects have been completed with LUMC, St. Mary's Parish, Children's Hospital, Waterton Canyon, Break Bread, the Rocky Mountain Feline Rescue, the VFW, and more. Troop 114G provides hundreds of hours of service annually! Your scout should participate service projects whenever possible. Projects are announced at Troop meetings, on Band and via email. The benefits are great to the organizer, the contributors and the recipient. Please encourage and enable your Scout to participate.

RANK ADVANCEMENT

Generally, a new Scout can complete Scout to First Class in one to two years. Star and Life rank can be reached within another one to two years. The path to Eagle Scout can require another complete year and must be achieved by the 18th birthday. Troop 114G has six Girls that are Eagle Scouts and several more will be soon. Speed is not the most important part of the journey. Your Scout will get out of Scouts whatever they commit. Troop 114's adult leaders are devoted to assisting any Scout to reach and attain their Eagle Scout rank.

MERIT BADGES









Merit badges are the second main area of the advancement program. There are more than 130 to choose from with around 13 that are required to reach the Eagle Rank. Scouts may work on merit badges anytime during their scouting career. Merit Badges can be earned individually, as a small group, with the Troop, at summer camp, or at district merit badge colleges, Colorado Adventure Point, or the Cell. Merit badge counselors are parents and other scouters who have completed online Youth Protection and Merit Badge Counselor training and have special skills in the area(s) of specific badges.

The Troop is always looking for more counselors to offer great learning opportunities for all scouts.

TROOP LEADERSHIP

Troop 114G has a Senior Patrol Leader and several Assistant Senior Patrol Leaders. The SPL organizes monthly Patrol Leader Council meetings to plan the activities that are selected during the Scout's Annual Planning Meeting.

Scouts are then organized into patrols under elected Patrol Leaders.

Other patrol positions include Scribe, Librarian, Quartermaster, Troop Guide, Historian, Webmaster, Instructor and more.


Youth elections take place twice a year to choose a Senior Patrol Leader and Patrol Leaders.




COMMUNICATIONS

FEES AND DUES

INITIAL FEES

ONGOING FEES - SCOUT ACOUNT

Upon registration the Troop establishes a Scout Account for each family. Activities are charged to this account, and fundraising or reimbursements are deposited into this account.

- You will be notified of your SA balance quarterly or when your balance is negative. Please make payments within 30 days of notice.
- Many families choose to pre-load their Scout Account via Venmo so that it doesn't go negative. Think of it like a school lunch account!
- Payment plans are available, particularly for extended trips.
- Costs for campouts are determined and charged to Scout Accounts within seven days of return.
- Request reimbursement for expenses such as camp food by sending receipts to the Treasurer within 14 days of expenditure.
- Fundraising earnings can be used to purchase uniforms or gear by submitting receipt to the treasurer.
- Venmo is the preferred payment method. Cash is allowable but discouraged.
- Scouts whose registration lapses forfeit any remaining balance.

FUNDRAISERS

HOLIDAY GREENS

October thru November

Online and door to door. Scouts collect orders in October with delivery near Thanksgiving. Products range from \$15 to \$40 with up to 30% profit. All proceeds are deposited into seller's Scout Accounts.



March - May

An earth friendly alternative in the fundraising world. Best quality bulbs and plants from growers in Holland and the USA. Families share a link and orders are shipped directly to supporters. 50% profit on orders, proceeds are deposited into sellers Scout Account.



September - October

The Council offers a Popcorn sale each year. Some scouts participate. All proceeds go to Scout Accounts, usually around 30% of sales.



A SCOUT IS THRIFTY!

Occasionally the Troop does collective fundraising activities to support itself, or to achieve a specific goal. Unlike reimbursement, fundraising funds cannot be dispersed as cash to participants. Funds may be transferred to another unit if a scout is moving, but is otherwise forfeited with lapsed membership in the troop.

UNIFORMS


Scouts are required to wear a "Class A" BSA uniform. The uniform is to be worn for Troop meetings, travel to and from camp, and for special events. It includes a khaki shirt, green pants or shorts, belt, neckerchief and slide, and socks. Please encourage your scout to wear it to all outings. Additionally our "Class B" t-shirt is for wearing during summer meetings, at service projects, camp and for casual activities.

The general rule is to wear "Class A" uniform unless it's announced otherwise.

SCOUTS BSA HANDBOOK

We will provide a Scout Handbook that Scouts should bring it to all activities. One book is used through the entire Scouting career, so mark their name on it. Book covers are highly recommended.

TROOP 114 GIRLS GUIDELINES

Approved January 28th, 2025

- 1.All Troop activities must have a minimum of two adults one of which must be female in accordance with Youth Protection guidelines.
- 2. Campouts must have a minimum of four adults and six scouts. The Scoutmaster has the authority to cancel campouts if the minimum participation isn't reached.
- 3. Activities should be considered non-refundable. Any funds spent by the Troop must be covered by the participants. Cancelling an RSVP does not guarantee a full refund.
- 4. Negative Scout Account balances should be brought to zero within 30 days. The Troop reserves the right to restrict activities for scouts with unpaid balances.
- 5. Sign-ups are closed before activities to allow the youth to plan. Cancelling after the deadline does not guarantee a refund, and signups after the deadlines are not always possible.
- 6. Packing lists are developed for Scout's safety. A pack inspection may occur prior to departure for scouts below 1st class. Parents will be notified when gear is missing or inadequate and are responsible for ensuring that their scout is prepared.
- 7.An active scout and their family may borrow Troop equipment if it doesn't interfere with planned activities. The family is financially responsible for returning the equipment in the same condition as it is taken.
- 8. Scouts can be held financially responsible for Troop equipment in the case of negligence or loss. Cots may not be used in troop tents as it damages waterproof floors.
- 9. An Annual Heath and Medical record must be completed for all youth and adults participating in Troop activities.
- 10. Any activity performed as a Scout activity must have prior approval of the Scoutmaster. This includes patrol meetings, hikes, projects, and other outings.
- 11. A scout is expected to attend as many Troop meetings as possible. At the Scoutmaster's discretion, inactive Scouts may be removed from positions of responsibility.
- 12. No open flames (stoves, lanterns, candles, matches, etc.) are permitted in tents.
- 13. Scouts should always practice the Buddy System. Scouts should not leave a camping area or meeting space without permission from the Senior Patrol Leader. Meetings will last until the scheduled end time, followed by a brief clean-up of the gathering space. The SPL will do their best to release scouts within 15 minutes after the meeting concludes.
- 14. Scouts must earn Totin' Chip before using any knife, saw, ax or hatchet.
- 15. Scouts are not permitted in the Adult Committee and adults are not permitted in the Patrol Area(s) without permission. Committee Members are not permitted in the Patrol Area(s) without permission. Under no circumstances are adults allowed in youth tents or youth in adult tents.
- 16. Scouts should be picked up promptly after activities at designated locations. The Adult Committee will post estimated arrival/release times on Band when possible. Inform adult leadership on Band of any alternate pickup arrangements (IE Uber, walking, etc). The Troop is not responsible after the activity's end time.
- 17.Cell Phones and other electronic devices are not permitted outside of cars at camp. Phones are collected during meetings unless specific use is required. The Scoutmaster has the authority to modify the phone policy to meet the needs of the Troop. The Troop is not responsible for damaged phones or electronics.

GUIDELINES FOR CAMPING PARENTS

Approved January 28th, 2025

- 1. The main role for adults in the Troop is to maintain safety. Activities are monitored to ensure that the Scout Oath & Law and the Outdoor Code and the Guide to Safe Scouting are abided by.
- 2.BSA Registration and background check is required for adults attending any overnight
- 3. Adults attending a camp must provide proof of Youth Protection Training and Medical Record.
- 4. New parents should step back from youth and allow them to become independent. If you feel inclined to show a scout how to do something "better" or more "efficiently", resist the temptation until you have been trained in the Scout Method. This can be difficult but will reward you in the future with strong capable scouts.
- 5. Adults sleep separately in their own tents. If available, the Troop can provide a tent for adults needing one. We camp in tents only—No RVs or campers are allowed. No pets allowed.
- 6. Adults cook and eat together in the Committee campsite. Each meal is assigned to an adult volunteer to purchase and prepare. Adult campers pay only \$20 for weekend campouts unless there are activity costs (IE, rafting, horse riding, etc.). The parent towing the trailer will be offered the standard IRS mileage reimbursement rate for the miles to and from the destination site.
- 7. Committee cooking equipment includes a stove, pots, pans, coffee pot, common cooking utensils, and cleaning supplies. Special cooking items, for example dutch ovens, extra-large kettles, etc. may be available, but cooks should ensure they get packed.
- 8. The following staples are provided by the Committee, and cooks do not need to purchase them: coffee, salt, pepper, aluminum foil, paper towels, lighters.
- 9. Parents should follow the same equipment packing list as the Scouts. This should include eating utensils, appropriate footwear, water bottle, sun protection and avoiding cotton where applicable.
- 10. Alcohol and recreational drugs are prohibited at all Scouting activities per National BSA regulations.
- 11. National BSA Policy indicates youth not registered in the unit may not participate in camping programs of the troop. When Troop 114G designates camps as family friendly, siblings may be guests of the Committee. Siblings at camp will camp and eat with the Committee and may only participate in activities as agreed upon by the Scoutmaster. This policy is in place to ensure adherence to BSA policy and to maintain the integrity of the program.
- 12. Smoking, vaping or other tobacco is discouraged and banned at most camp facilities. If you must use these products, it must be out of view of the scouts and in a safe area.
- 13. The Scoutmaster is the main point of contact to the scouts. Directions, suggestions and comments should not be provided directly to the scouts as it can undermine the Scout Method, cause mixed signals, and breakdown the team hierarchy.
- 14. If an unsafe condition or activity is observed, do step in and correct it. Committee members should remain positive with the Scouts, follow the Guide to Safe Scouting and Youth Protection guidelines. The Scoutmaster in charge of the activity should always be notified if an unsafe condition was observed or if a scout was injured.

ADULT ONBOARDING CHECKLIST
